Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ

CORPUS CHRISTI SUNDAY, the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ, will be celebrated on June 6, 2010. This is a commemoration of the Institution of the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist.

Actually, Holy Thursday is the "anniversary" of the institution of the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. On this day, we recall the Last Supper when the Lord Jesus "took bread, said a blessing and broke it, and gave it to his disciples saying, "Take and eat; this is my body." (Matthew 26: 26)

However, the commemoration of the Lord's Passion (beginning on Holy Thursday up to Good Friday) suppresses our rejoicing over the greatest treasure God has given us-the HOLY EUCHARIST.

Corpus Christi Sunday was then introduced in the 13th Century to encourage the faithful to give special honor to the Lord Jesus in the Holy Eucharist.

The Eucharist means "thanksgiving." It is a sacrifice of thanksgiving to God the Father for all His benefits-- the gift of creation, redemption, and sanctification.

Aside from thanksgiving and praise, the Eucharist is also a "sacrificial memorial of Christ and his Body" and the "real presence of Christ" by the power of His Word and Spirit.

The Year of the Priest



Message from our Parish Priest

Renewed Priests for a Renewed Community

This month, and specifically on June 11, we will celebrate our yearly Solemnity of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. It was exactly on the same feast last year that the Holy Father, Pope Benedict XVI declared 2009-1010 to be a year to remember, honor and pray for all the priests in the world. One of his original intentions for the Year of the Priest is to start a fundamental renewal movement in the whole Catholic Church. Our modern world has seen remarkable advances in almost all aspects for the betterment of human life. At the same time, our modern world has also deteriorated in so many ways, particularly in violence like terrorism and in ethics and morality like the financial crisis in advanced countries and the rampant spread of anti-life practices. The Catholic Church has not been spared in the deterioration of moral values and traditional practices. as was the case of accusations of sexual abuse of some priests. For the Holy Father, who is a faithful student of history, no renewal will sweep across the Church as a whole without first undertaking a serious renewal in its leadership and its priests. The holiness of the community must begin with the holiness of its pastors.

The Catholic Church in the Philippines has taken in earnest the Year of the Priest. Beginning the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart last year and for the succeeding first Fridays until this month's first Friday, all parishes have been holding vigil adorations to pray for the holiness of priests. Special intentions were prayed at every mass for the sanctification of priests. Numerous articles and features on broadcast and print media have brought out the significance and role that priests play in the life of the community. A very successful gathering of almost all the priests in our country was held on the last week of January which served as a fruitful spiritual retreat.

St. John Marie Vianney became the role model and inspiration of all the priests in their demeanor and ministry. Greater attention and initiatives were started to promote vocations to the priestly life, whether diocesan or religious and better formation programs are instituted to train worthy ministers. The long overdue

awareness and appreciation for the priests in our country was finally given where it was due. Here in our parish, the culture of respect and love for and cooperation with the parish priest and his assisting priests had always been proverbial. Had the Year of the Priest not been instituted, the people of this parish would still have shown admirable care and fidelity to their priests. But thanks also to the celebration of the Year of the Priest, all of us are made more aware of the essential role that the priests assume in the life and development of the parish. I have mentioned it in my homilies more than once an enlightening idea I read so many years ago in the seminary:

"A community gets the priest that it deserves."

A priest, especially a pastor, is not a superman, somebody who can pretend to know-it-all, plan-it -all and do-it-all. A priest who does everything and behaves as if everything depends on him is not a good priest. While humility and dedication should be the basic character of a priest in his ministry, the spirit of collaboration and edification should be the basic ingredient of a pastor when he has to deal with his flock. A priest must show the way to his people and as a leader, he is the first to show good example for emulation. In the same respect, the community must also show good example to the priest by their obedience to church laws and active participation in parish activities. In the same way that the community draws its life and inspiration from the holiness of its priest, so also a priest draws the meaning and value of his own priesthood and ministry from the life of his community. If the priest is holy, the community will be holy. If the community is holy, the priest will be holy. Just as the community is continually nourished by the sacraments offered by the priest, so is a priest constantly fed by the life and holiness of his people. As we close our celebration of the Year of the Priests, may God constantly bless us with holy people and sanctified priests!


The Priesthood

At the Last Supper, commemorated every Holy Thursday, the Lord Jesus instituted not only the Sacrament of the HOLY EUCHARIST but also the PRIESTHOOD.

The Lord Jesus Himself is the Great High Priest. All Catholics, through the Sacrament of Baptism, share in the priesthood of the Lord Jesus Christ. This kind of priesthood is called the "common priesthood."

However, ordained PRIESTS have a different function and essence. Ordained priests have received the Sacrament of Holy Orders.

This sacrament confers on a man the grace and spiritual power to celebrate the Church's sacraments (such as baptism, confirmation, marriage, Eucharist, and so on).



In February 2010, Pope Benedict XVI said **the priesthood is a "way of life"** and not merely a job that can be fulfilled or accomplished for a certain number of hours each day.

The Pope said priests are called to be a bridge between God and suffering humanity. He urged priests "to enter like Christ into human misery and take it up, going to the people who are suffering" and sharing their pain.



repay the debt, he forgave it for both. Which of them will love him more?" Simon said in reply, "The one, I suppose, whose larger debt was forgiven." He said to him, "You have judged rightly." Then he turned to the woman and said to Simon, "Do you see this woman? When I entered your house, you did not give me water for my feet, but she has bathed them with her tears and wiped them with her hair. You did not give me a kiss, but she has not ceased kissing my feet since the time I entered. You did not anoint my head with oil, but she anointed my feet with ointment. So I tell you, her many sins have been forgiven because she has shown great love. But the one to whom little is forgiven, loves little." He said to her, "Your sins are forgiven." The others at table said to themselves, "Who is this who even forgives sins?" But he said to the woman, "Your faith has saved you; go in peace." Afterward he journeyed from one town and village to another, preaching and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom of God. Accompanying him were the Twelve and some women who had been cured of evil spirits and infirmities. Mary, called Magdalene, from whom seven demons had gone out, Joanna, the wife of Herod's steward Chuza, Susanna, and many others who provided for them out of their resources.

Reflection: He who is forgiven much, loves much. When we realize how greatly we have sinned against God and how generously He has forgiven us, we will learn to have a greater love for God and neighbor.

Prayer: Lord God, we have sinned against You so many times. Thank You for generously forgiving us and always welcoming us back into Your loving embrace. Amen.

JUNE 20, 2010

Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Grand Alay 2010

MAY is a month dedicated to the BLESSED VIRGIN MARY. In 1859, Pope Pius IX, granted a plenary indulgence to those who dedicate the month of May to our Blessed Mother. At the St. John Bosco Parish Church, a grand flower offering called "Grand Alay" was held after the 6:00 p.m. Mass on May 29, 2010, in honor of Mary Help of Christians.



This tradition has been observed in the parish for more than 30 years now. After a community praying of the rosary, "floristas" or young girls dressed in in white, walk down the aisle to offer flower-covered "almazons" (from *armazon*, the Spanish word for "frame"). The bamboo-and-wire frames or almazons represent religious symbols and some titles of the Blessed Virgin Mary. To prepare the floristas for the Grand Alay, Fr. Ting Miciano, SDB, Parish Priest, organized a recollection and catechetical lessons on the rosary with the help of the Education and Worship ministries, the Grand Alay coordinators, and the Legion of Mary. In a short address to the girls during the final rehearsal, Fr. Ting stressed the role of the Grand Alay and other Marian devotions in drawing the faithful closer to Jesus through Mary.

Purity requires MODESTY, the virtue that protects the intimate center of a person.


Modesty is about decency and discretion. As Christians, we are called to dress and act modestly at all times and most especially when we come to Mass to worship God.

Sacred Heart of Jesus


On June 11, we will celebrate the SOLEMNITY OF THE SACRED HEART OF JESUS.

This solemnity is always celebrated on the Friday after Corpus Christi Sunday (Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ), which falls on June 6 this year.

The Most Holy Heart of Jesus burns with so much love for each one of us. The Lord Jesus loves us so much that He wants to reconcile us to God.

The devotion to the SACRED HEART OF JESUS is one of the earliest Christian devotions.

However, even though the early Christians already had a devotion to the Heart of Jesus, it was only during the time of St. Margaret Mary Alacoque of France (1647-1690) that the devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus became widespread.



Saint Margaret Mary was said to have received apparitions of the Lord Jesus. The greatest apparition reportedly happened in June 1675 when the Lord Jesus said, "Behold the Heart that has so loved men ... instead of gratitude I receive from the greater part (of mankind) only ingratitude ..." He then asked that a feast of REPARATION be celebrated every Friday after Corpus Christi Sunday.
