June is the month of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. And the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart is intimately connected with the Solemnity of the Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi). When He appeared to Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque in June 1675, our Lord asked that the Friday after the feast of Corpus Christi be set apart as a special feast day in honor of His Sacred Heart.

Their connection, however, is so much more than the dates designated for both solemnities.[1] It is the story of God's love for us; it is a promise of the fullness of our love and life.

Our heart's desire...

One of man's deepest longings is to be loved. Yet, that longing cannot be fully satisfied by any other person. For human love is imperfect as well as limited. Man's yearning, however, is not bound to be in vain. For God has always offered and continues to offer His perfect, infinite, and unconditional love for us.

The Sacred Heart as source of divine life and love...

The divine love of God is transformative. It makes all things new. The cross which was a symbol of pain and shame has now become the perfect revelation of God's love. A clear expression of how much God loves us is the open heart of Jesus on the cross, exposed when His side was pierced with a Roman soldier's spear. In this connection, Pope Benedict XVI exclaimed, "it is from Jesus' heart, pierced on the Cross, that this divine life streamed forth."[2]

In the cross, Jesus fulfills the words of the prophet and changes man's "heart of stone" wounded by sin into a "heart of flesh" like His. His Sacred Heart strengthens us so that we may follow His commandment: "love one another as I love you." He gives us His love and, at the same time, He enables us to love with His same love, to love one another as He loves us.

Devotion to the Sacred Heart leads us to a deeper love of God and our fellow man. It impels us to live out this love in a concrete manner. And if we recognize Jesus and His Sacred Heart in the Eucharist, we are able to recognize our brethren who suffer, who hunger or thirst, who are strangers or naked or sick or imprisoned. We become aware of others and we make a definite commitment to care for those who are in need. We learn to live a life of love, loving God and loving one another, sharing in the abundance of living waters flowing from divine love.

The Sacred Heart and the Eucharist...

Saint Peter Julian Eymard declared, "the Divine Heart is living and palpitating in the Eucharist."

The Eucharist, that is the Body and Blood of Christ, is the whole Christ with His human heart offered to God and given to us so that we may have eternal life. And when we receive Jesus in the Eucharist, we experience him as the Emmanuel, the God who is not only with us but in us.

The Sacred Heart of Jesus becomes the sanctuary of our restless hearts. And we live in an abundance of love as we partake in the fullness of life.

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10 USEFUL LIFE CHOICES

A MESSAGE FROM OUR PARISH PRIEST



Classes in schools, colleges and universities have begun once again. And so have the rains! Because most households will be burdened with school requirements and ballooning budgets, many of us will be at a loss and will lose our composure in the frantic rush. In these busy moments, may I offer useful but mostly forgotten tips that can keep our feet firmly on the ground while our spirit looks up brightly to the sky. Here are 10 important things to remember which I have adapted from an article I read in the June 2012 issue of World Mission Magazine,

- a) The value of time. The management of time must be our number one priority. Without some organization, the day will waste away without purpose and drain away without accomplishment.
- b) The success of perseverance. It was through perseverance that the snail reached Noah's Ark. To get through the hardest journey, we need to take one step at a time, but we must keep on stepping forward.
- c) The pleasure of working. It's the only thing we can do for eight hours straight, without eating or drinking. Find a job or something to do that's suited to your talents and then do a lot more work than you're paid for. In time, you'll be "paid" much more for what you do.
- d) The worth of character. Character is what you are in the dark. There's just no substitute for it. Promises must be kept, deadlines met, commitments honored, not just for the sake of morality, but because we become what we do or fail to do; character is simply the sum of all our performances.

- e) The power of discipline. The Chinese have a saying that when parents are afraid to put their foot down, their children will step on their toes. If parents believe that standards and values are necessary, then discipline is certainly needed to attain them.
- f) The influence of example. Experience is the best teacher. The world is full of people who succeeded in life because they fought for what they thought was right. "Example is not the main thing in influencing others. It is the only thing". (Albert Schweitzer)
- g) The tranquility of solitude. The world has developed a phobia of being alone. Practice the art of 'aloneness' and you will discover the treasure of tranquility. Develop the art of solitude and you will unearth the gift of serenity.
- h) The virtue of patience. Patience, in Greek means "to stay under". The key to everything is patience. Quiet patience can and does master and outlive all boisterous, stormy human discords.
- i) The improvement of talent. Encourage people, especially children, to use their talents in their own ways. There is a good deal of wasted talent because of ignorance; they simply don't know how to apply their energies.
- j) The sound of music. A little boy who loved music was bitterly disappointed because he could neither play nor sing. But Amati, the violin-maker, told him: "There are many ways of making music. What matters is the song in your heart." So Antonio Stradivarius was encouraged to become the world's greatest violin-maker.

UPDATES ON THE GRADUAL IMPLEMENTATION OF THE NEW ENGLISH TRANSLATION OF THE ROMAN MISSAL

Beginning June 10, 2012 (Corpus Christi Sunday) in the Archdiocese on Manila, the 2nd most frequently repeated response in English Masses, "And also with you", will be replaced by, "And with your spirit".

"AND WITH YOUR SPIRIT"

The new English translation of the Roman Missal offers a totally different response to the greeting, "The Lord be (is) with you"[1]. The new response, "And with your spirit" is a direct literal translation of the Latin original, "Et cum spiritu tuo", in accordance with a Vatican directive.

The use and meaning of the word "spirit" carries a great weight of philosophy and theology. In Greek philosophy, the "spirit" represents what is best and noblest in a person. Theologically, "spiritus" does not refer



to the Holy Spirit or to the spirit of the priesthood. Rather, it emphasizes the presence of Christ in the celebration of the Eucharist in both the celebrant and the participant.

When the people reply, "And with your spirit", they return the greeting and express the prayerful wish that the priest will also be filled with the presence of the risen Lord, and that his ministry may receive the power and blessing of the Holy Spirit.

Fr. Chris was born in the County of Offaly in Ireland on September 6, 1946. He belongs to a family of nine. Save for one sister who

Bro. Chris first arrived in the Philippines in 1967 to take up Philosophy, Education and Practical Training in Canlubang. He went back to Ireland after 4 1/2 years to finish his priestly studies and was ordained on June 26, 1976 in St. Ita's Church in his home parish in Coolderry. Thirty-six years ago, after receiving his first obedience as Principal of Don Bosco Juniorate in Bacolor, Pampanga, Fr. Chris returned to the Philippines where he has been serving ever since. Having lived among Filipinos for 40 ½ years combined, the Irish priest could read and write homilies in Tagalog and had celebrated Tagalog Masses with passable fluency.

SOLEMNITY OF THE BODY & BLOOD OF CHRIST (B)

June 10, 2012 Readings

- *Ex 24:1-3-8 Moses and the people of Israel solemnly ratify the covenant with the Lord.
- *Heb 9:11-15 Christ is the mediator of the New Covenant sealed through his sacrificial death.
- *Mk 14:12-16.22-26 During the Passover, Jesus institutes the Eucharist as the sacrificial meal of the New Covenant.

Theme: A COVENANT THAT LEADS TO COMMUNION

Every time we celebrate the Eucharist, we renew our alliance with God, not as isolated individuals, but as members of His new Chosen People, the Church. Just as the people of Israel ratified its covenant with the Lord at the foot of Mt. Sinai through the blood of the victims offered in sacrifice, so do we renew our alliance with Him through the blood of Jesus, the sacrificial Victim of the New Covenant.

This should be sufficient reason why we cannot be detached or distracted onlookers while the Eucharist is being celebrated. We are among the "contracting parties" and the beneficiaries of the Covenant. Hence we should feel deeply and personally involved in it. Our whole-hearted active presence in the celebration manifests our determination to keep the terms of the Covenant (that are synthesized in the commandments to love God and neighbor), and live in communion

with the Blessed Trinity and our neighbor.

11TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME (B)

Father's Day June 17, 2012 Readings

- *Ez 17:22-24 The Lord promises a time of prosperity to the dispirited exiles in Babylon.
- *2 Cor 5:6-10 Paul reminds us that we should, at all times, please the Lord and yearn to be with him forever.
- *Mk 4:24-34 Jesus compares the Kingdom to a seed that develops wonderfully, thanks to the power of God's grace.

Theme: WITNESSES AND PARTNERS OF GOD'S WONDERS

Today we are invited to meditate on the wonder of God's Kingdom, the marvelous PROJECT that has its roots in the love of the Lord for all mankind. This "Godinitiated" project was formally launched by Jesus Christ, who was not only its most zealous herald, but also its most perfect actualization.

Today's First Reading reminds us that God's initiative defies all human predictions and overcomes all crises, including the one that engulfed the Jews exiled in Babylon. In the Gospel, through two short parables, Jesus reveals to us the immense potentials of the Kingdom – potentials that are not only to be admired but also developed through our generous cooperation.

We should praise the Lord for the marvelous growth of the Kingdom in ourselves and around us. It is, likewise, our duty to thank Him for having made us not only witnesses of its wonders, but also His partners in facilitating its growth.



BIRTH OF ST. JOHN THE BAPTIST

June 24, 2012 Readings

- *Is 49:1-6 The call and mission of the Servant of Yahweh
- *Acts 13:22-26 The role of John the Baptist in the mission of Jesus
- *Lk 1:57-66.80 The birth and circumcision of John the Baptist

Theme: JOHN, THE GREAT FORERUNNER

The birth of John the Baptist was a salient point in the fulfillment of God's plan. With him, centuries of expectation and longing came to an end, and the time of fulfillment dawned. His mission would be to proclaim the decisive importance of this moment and the need to respond to it with a sincere conversion that would enable everyone to welcome the Messiah.

The circumstances surrounding the conception and the birth of John showed that he belonged to the category of great prophets like Samuel and Jeremiah. He was the last prophet of the Old Testament, and actually the most privileged of them all, for his mission was to prepare the hearts of the people to welcome the Messiah already present in their midst. He himself would point Jesus out to the crowds as "the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world" (Jn 1:29), while declaring himself unworthy even to unfasten the strap of the Messiah's sandals. (See Jn 1:27.) This made John a real giant of humility and loyalty, two virtues for which he will be remembered with admiration in all centuries.

13TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME (B)


July 1, 2012 Readings

- *Wis 1:13-15; 2:23-24 God is the author of life. Death has been introduced into the world by the devil.
- *2 Cor 8:7.9.13-15 Paul encourages the faithful to be generous in imitating Christ, who became poor for the sake of us all.
- *Mk 5:21-43 Jesus heals a woman who was suffering from hemorrhage, and calls back to to life the daughter of Jairus.

Theme: WE BELIEVE IN THE GOD OF LIFE AND WHOLENESS

Death is one of the realities that we will never be able to eliminate. From a simply earthly perspective, it is the greatest of all frustrations. And it is particularly disconcerting when it mows down people who are young, or specially beautiful or bright, or are needed in a family or society. A believer faces the challenge of death and all the questions it poses with the help of God's revelation, according to which, death and suffering are not part of God's original plan but have been introduced into our lives by the devil when he convinced the first human beings to disobey God's instructions. God wants to restore humankind to its original status of wholeness and immortality. Such is the message of divine revelation. It is synthesized and confirmed by the teaching and actions of Jesus Christ, as exemplified in today's Gospel passage.

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

May 24 in the Salesian calendar is one of the greatest feasts honoring Mary Help of Christians. On the day of his triumphant return from captivity, Pope Pius VII gratefully established a feast to honor Mary. The devotion to MHC spread all over the Catholic world, owing largely to the great Saint John Bosco, who founded the Salesian Society and the Institute of the Daughters of Mary Help of Christians (FMA).

Don Bosco also founded the Archconfraternity of Mary Help of Christians (ARCHCON), including lay people in the spirituality and mission of the Salesian congregation in the task of "promoting devotion to the Blessed Sacrament and to Mary Help of Christians."

SJB Parish of Makati dedicates the 24th of every month to Mary Help of Christians. On this day, 38 ARCHCON members, including four founding members: Betty Velhagen, Chit Feria, Carol Ocampo and, Vins Clemente, have monthly gatherings.

Last March 24, Fr. Dennis Paez, SDB, proposed two projects for the ARCHCON's consideration: the renovation of the gallery

of saints and the installation of exhibit cases in the Mary Help of Christians Chapel behind the Parish church to permanently house the relics of different saints.

Aside from redesigning and refurbishing the gallery of saints, and adding the images of St. Pio of Pietrelcina and Blessed John Paul II, Fr. Dennis suggested including a replica of the brick house in Becchi, Italy where the saint was born and where he dreamt at nine years old of his God-given mission to save young people. The replica will feature a piece of brick from the actual house, a loving donation from one of the ARCHCON founders to the SJB Salesian Community.

Fr. Dennis also suggested that the reliquaries be exhibited on opposite walls of the Mary Help of Christians Chapel. The reliquaries of famous saints like St. Francis of Assisi and St. Therese will be on one side, while those of the Salesian Saints including: St. John Bosco, St. Dominic Savio, will be on the other. Most of the relics were gifts given to Fr. Dennis.

Delighted with the proposals, we unanimously agreed to sponsor the projects and immediately raised the funds, expecting
